THE COBBER BEANIE

Introduced in 1922, and originally green, the Cobber beanie is a tradition that all Concordia students participate in during their first days on campus. First-year students receive a gold beanie, while transfer students receive a maroon beanie. Students are encouraged to wear their beanies during Orientation Week until the first day of class. The beanie, much like a graduation cap, is a symbol of the start of a new journey. Orientation is officially concluded with a beloved event, the beanie toss. This will take place on Wednesday morning after Convocation on the first day of classes.

FUN FACT: The beanies originally were worn until the Cobber football team scored their first touchdown.



CLASS OF 2029

The Class of 2029 at Concordia College includes more than 570 students — 540 from the United States, including 66% from Minnesota, 20% from North Dakota, and 14% from other states.

We have nearly 30 international students representing over 15 different countries. We also welcome over 35 transfer students to Concordia this fall. Looking at the participation of this year's class, 39% are student athletes and 17% have received music scholarships.

This is a partnership and your advisor offers guidance. With their help, you get to make the decisions about your goals and experience.

INVOLVEMENT AND ENGAGEMENT AT CONCORDIA

Being involved on campus can mean a lot of different things. However it's defined, multiple studies have demonstrated that involvement boosts sense of community and support, time management and leadership skills, academic performance, and graduation rates.

Students who are involved on campus (compared to students who are not involved):

- Students who get involved early are 12-20% more likely to graduate (National Center for Education Statistics).
- Students who are engaged in cocurricular activities in their first year are 30-40% more likely to continue to their sophomore year (National Survey of Student Engagement & American Council on Education).
- Students who participate with campus organizations and leadership roles have GPAs that are 0.2-0.5 points higher than students who are not involved (Journal of College Student Development).
- Students who are involved have a higher sense of satisfaction with their college experience and a stronger sense of belonging (National Survey of Student Engagement).

Being involved and engaged at Concordia can happen in a variety of ways!

- Simply show up to a campus event (check Cobber Connect for a calendar of fun things to do).
- Join a student organization — there are nearly 100 to choose from, in a variety of categories:
 - Interests or hobbies
 - Affinity group identity
 - Major/minor
 - Common purpose
 - Just for fun/random
- Take on a leadership role — run for Student Government Association, work for Campus Events Commission, Campus Ministry Commission, or the Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Commission.
- Be involved in intramurals, an ensemble, an athletic team, Orientation, Homecoming, or any other number of ways to engage.

Mark your calendar for Sunday, Sept. 7, for Cobber Expo — a showcase of all of Concordia's active student organizations.

CENTER FOR HOLISTIC HEALTH

Everyone needs extra support at one time or another. The **Center for Holistic Health** is here to support your well-being. We offer the following student services:

MENTAL HEALTH COUNSELING

Meet with one of our licensed mental health counselors to help address a variety of concerns, such as anxiety, depression, grief, relationship issues, stress, and lifestyle changes. Counseling sessions are free and students generally attend an average of five to eight 50-minute sessions.

DISABILITY SERVICES

Our disability services coordinator is here to help you explore or review your need for accommodations (academic, physical, housing, etc.) due to a current physical or psychological condition, recent surgical/medical procedure, or learning disability.

HEALTH SERVICES

Whether you need assistance connecting to off-campus health services, health/wellness education, or support navigating our community healthcare system — the Center for Holistic Health is here to help you! If needed, we also provide support with basic needs like food, clothing, and hygiene. Importantly, the CHH is home to the Cobber Food Pantry and the Emergency Assistance Program for Students.

TIMELYCARE

Concordia partners with TimelyCare, a virtual health and wellbeing platform, to bring you **free** virtual healthcare services 24/7, 365 days per year. Simply download the app to your phone or use your Concordia student login on your laptop at timelycare.com/concordia to get started!

TimelyCare services include:

- On-demand and scheduled medical care (no limit); if treatment requires prescription medication, student must use health insurance or pay out of pocket for medication
- On-demand (no limit) and scheduled mental healthcare therapy (limit of 12 scheduled therapy sessions per year)
- Health coaching (no limit)
- Self-paced health and wellbeing modules (e.g., grief, divorce, anxiety, yoga, boundaries, etc.)
- Mental health peer support communities

CAMPUS SECURITY AND PUBLIC SAFETY

PUBLIC SAFETY — Some schools have campus police. At Concordia, we have public safety officers. They are employees of the college who are available by phone 24/7, 365 days a year. **Put this number in your phone: 218.299.3123**

SAFE WALKS — If requested, the Public Safety Office will provide escorts and accompany any student within a one-block radius of campus. Call the number above to request a Safe Walk.

BLUE LIGHTS — You'll notice 12 blue lights located around various parts of campus. These blue lights can be used to connect directly with the Public Safety Office if you need assistance or feel unsafe in any way. The blue lights also serve as a campuswide safety announcement system.

THEFT — Campus is not only a place for you to learn but also a place where you live. While we all work to uphold a high standard of community respect, security issues occasionally occur. If you experience theft, contact Public Safety to submit a report.

ALCOHOL, TOBACCO, AND OTHER DRUGS — Concordia is a tobacco and drug free campus. If you use tobacco, there are designated areas for you to go. Concordia does allow alcohol on campus for students 21 years and older who are approved through the Residence Life process.

TOP 5 WAYS TO PREPARE FOR ACADEMIC SUCCESS

1

ASK A LOT OF QUESTIONS

When your classes meet for the first time, ask about attendance and participation for each class. Ask about how to best communicate with your instructors and your academic advisor. They may prefer email or they may be willing to send and receive texts. If you will be absent or if you need help with the materials, know how to get in touch with your resources. Don't be shy about asking — knowing your expectations is how you succeed!

2

KNOW YOUR RESOURCES

You may not need them right away, but think about where support services are located and how to use them. Some key resources to be familiar with include the Center for Holistic Health, Financial Aid, the Registrar's Office, ITS (Information Technology Services) Solution Center, and the Business Office.

MANAGE YOUR TIME

Your class schedule will likely allow you a lot of open time. Dedicate the time outside of class to study, do your homework, and communicate with your classmates and faculty. Establish a routine to ensure you are getting adequate sleep, making time to eat, finding time for fun and exercise, and working if you have a job.

GET INVOLVED

As important as it is to study and learn inside and outside of class, be sure to meet people outside of your classes. There are lots of opportunities. Joining a club or taking a course on a new topic that interests you will help you try new things, establish networking connections for the future, and help you grow and learn more about yourself.

TAKE CARE OF YOURSELF

Starting college can be exciting and stressful. Do things that you know are good for you: eat healthy foods, get plenty of sleep, exercise, see your friends, and have fun. College is what you create it to be. Be an active participant and embrace your experience!

ENSEMBLE PARTICIPATION

Concordia offers many music ensembles (including our new drumline!) for students of all majors and levels of ability. Some require a placement audition and others allow students to simply sign up to join. Auditions take place during Orientation Week, so stop by soon!

Incoming music majors should make sure they have private lessons, piano (class or lessons), music theory (MUS 111), and aural skills classes (MUS 115 and MUS 116) on their schedule. Please be advised that an audition/interview is required for admission to all preprofessional music degree programs (all Bachelor of Music degrees and the Bachelor of Arts degree in music education). 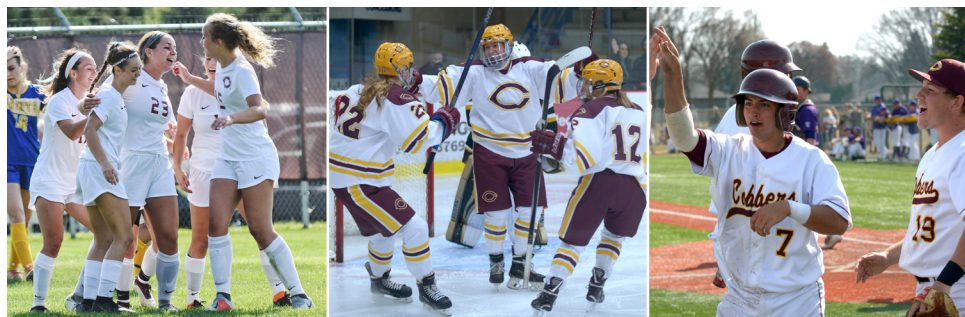

SUSTAINABILITY

Concordia has dedicated itself to becoming carbon neutral by 2050, and we believe environmental and social sustainable practices are necessary to achieve this. Concordia will cut its carbon emissions through a variety of strategies, including behavior changes, geothermal energy, and more. Part of this goal is practicing sustainable living, both socially and environmentally, and Concordia offers numerous ways for all students to get involved in helping achieve this goal. Here are some of the ways Concordia is paving its path toward carbon neutrality and creating opportunities for students to participate in campus sustainability.

TRANSPORTATION — **COBBikes**, Concordia's bike share bikes, can be checked out through the library and are free to use by all students. Additionally, Concordia provides students with free **MATBUS** passes to help reduce our carbon footprint and increase transportation security.

CAMPUS ORGANIC GARDEN — **Cornucopia** is a student-run organic garden, created to educate the community about food production that is healthy, environmentally sustainable, and practical — in a manner that encourages active engagement to lessen our global footprint. Cornucopia is located east of Grant Center, home of the Offutt School of Business, and anyone is welcome to visit or harvest from the garden at any time. Additionally, there are two garden internships available during the academic year and two available during the summer.

COBBER FREE STORE — **The Free Store** is essentially a mini thrift store — where everything is completely free for students to take. It is stocked with clothing, shoes, kitchenware, books, winter gear, and more. The Free Store is located in Knutson Campus Center 106 and open 24/7. Students are also able to donate gently used items that they no longer need.

STUDENT INVOLVEMENT — The **Office of Sustainability** hires interns each year for positions that range from coordinating sustainability events to marketing campus sustainability efforts, to becoming a paid gardener for the summer.

High Impact Leadership Trips are student planned and led spring break trips that focus on a sustainability topic of their choice. If interested in participating in or leading a trip, reach out to the Office of Sustainability.

Student Environmental Alliance is a student organization that is dedicated to promoting environmentally friendly behaviors on campus through education and engagement events.

Students can also use the library's Interlibrary Loan (ILL) service to borrow materials that the Carl B. may not have. CONNECTING TO CAMPUS WI-FI

Depending on your device and operating system, the instructions for connecting to Wi-Fi might be slightly different. In most cases, look for the CCsecure network. Use your Concordia username (your email address without the @cord.edu) and your Concordia password to connect. For more specific instructions, go to the ITS Solution Center page on CobberNet. The recommended network in residential spaces for smart TVs, gaming consoles, and streaming devices is CCmedia. Check the Solution Center for specific information about these networks. Apple users are encouraged to visit ITS for proper PaperCut installation and configuration.

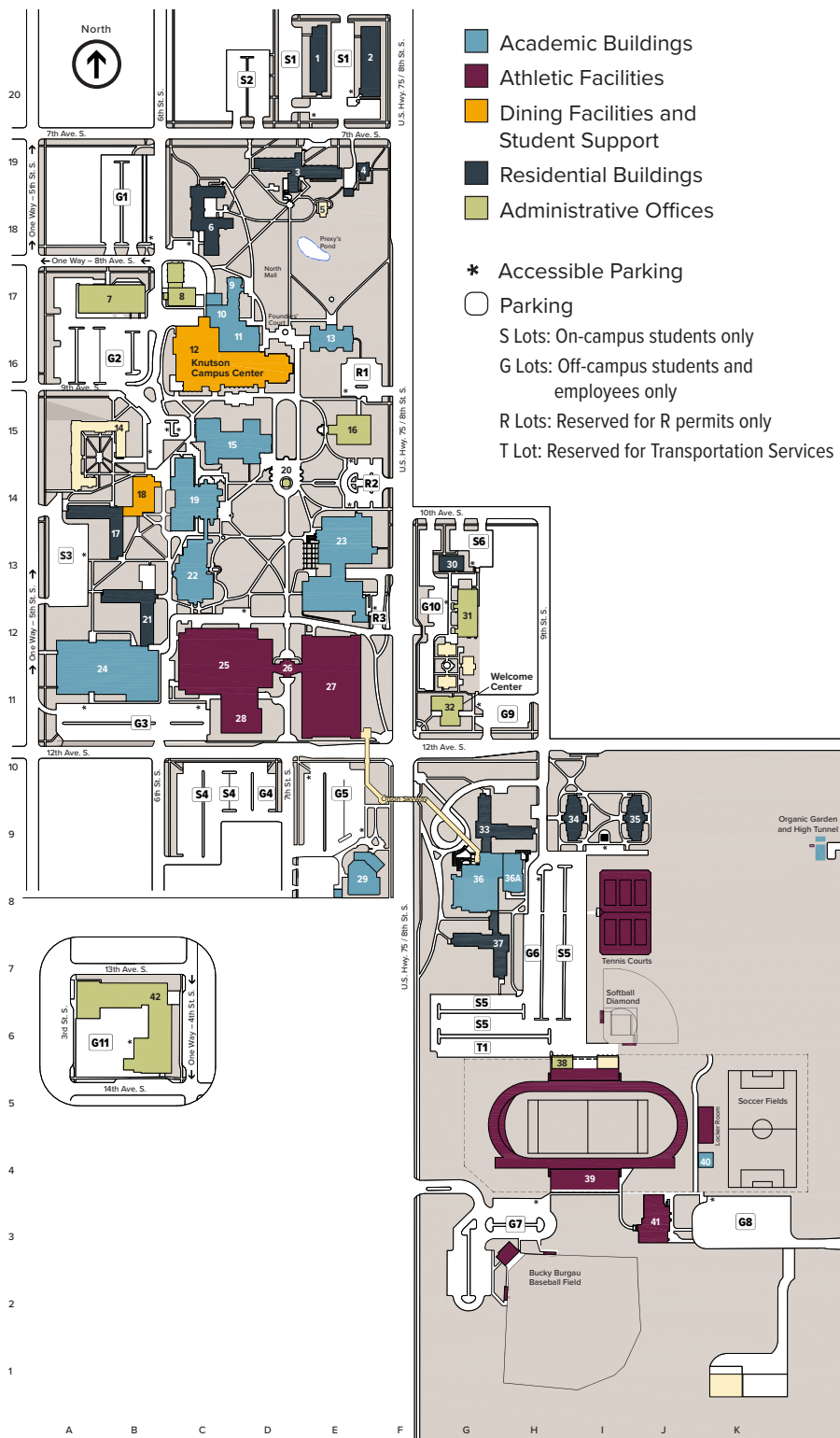
