## **Concordia College Update**

**President Craft** announced his upcoming retirement at the end of his second presidential term, on June 30, 2023. The Board of Regents has already started seeking Concordia's next president with a search committee and national consulting firm.

**New Executive Director for Faith and Learning,** Dr. Michael Chan, will direct the Lorentzsen and Dovre Centers, guide Concordia's interfaith relationships, and oversee the work of Campus Ministry. He will be welcomed to the college in June.

**New Dean of Sanford Heimarck School of Health Professionals,** Dr. Gwen Wagstrom Halaas '75 brings more than four decades of research, teaching, program development and administrative experience to Concordia. She grew up in the Fargo-Moorhead area and is a 1975 graduate of Concordia. Dr. Halaas will assume the role on July 1, 2022.

Achievement Award The Concordia National Alumni
Board has selected Phyllis (Bryn-Julson) Sutherland as
one of the 2022 Alumni Achievement Award Recipients.
She is a Concordia alumna who started with us in 1963.
She was a member of the Concordia concert choir for
two years. While at Concordia, she received a
fellowship to study and perform at the Tanglewood
summer music festivals1964-67. It was there she came
to the attention of Gunther Schuller, Artistic Director of
the Berkshire Music Center at Tanglewood, who was
impressed by her ability to sight-read 12-note music.



She transferred to Syracuse University where she completed her bachelor's and master's degrees. Her first professional debuts were at Carnegie Hall in 1964 and the Boston Symphony Orchestra in 1966. Her voice is described as having both purity and clarity of timbre; possessed as well of perfect pitch, and a range of three octaves. She

performed extensively around the world, received two Grammy Award nominations and has over 100 recordings and CDs. She accepted the duties of chair of the Voice Department, Peabody Conservatory, Johns Hopkins University in 1985 and continued to work there until her retirement. In 1988 she became the first American performing artist to present a master class in Russia at the renowned Moscow Conservatory. In 1997, she received an Honorary Doctorate from Concordia College. She ended her 40-year performing career with a farewell concert at the Kennedy Center in 2005.

**Learn. Work.** Lead. A Concordia College education is rooted in the college's deep commitment to providing a transformational experience for every one of our students through learning, working and leadership. Development has continued on our academic framework through **Three Schools, One College:** 

- → Sanford Heimarck School of Health Professions
- → Offutt School of Business
- → School of Arts and Sciences

Concordia will begin renovation in the summer of 2022 on the Sanford Clinic building adjacent to campus to provide expanded laboratory, classroom, and centralized office space for its freshly named Sanford Heimarck School of Health Professions. The project will include a nursing simulation lab and a human performance lab. It will be a remarkable advancement to the program.

**COVID Response/Planning** Concordia continues to monitor guidance from the Minnesota Department of Health and the CDC to keep the campus as healthy as possible amid the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic. Students, faculty, and staff are updated regularly and encouraged to engage in risk-reducing practices to prioritize inperson learning and working through the academic year.

Advancing the Mission: Cobber Ambassador Program A new initiative was officially launched to invigorate the unique network and relationships among alumni, friends, and students of Concordia College. Cobber Ambassadors are people who care about the students and mission, believe in the college, and help spread the word about Concordia's life-changing education. - → Renovation was completed in Christiansen Recital Hall to provide a higher quality and more modern experience for students and guests.

- → An Indoor Performance Center for golf was added in Olson Forum using the latest simulator technology to provide year-round training for the men's and women's golf programs.
- → Olson Forum's workout balcony will be expanded this summer.

Concordia Recognized for Women in Coaching The University of Minnesota's Tucker Center for Research on Girls & Women in Sport gave Concordia an "A" grade on its 2020-21 report card. The college was highlighted for having female head coaches for 70% of its women's sports. Concordia was the only MIAC school to receive an "A" grade in the report. Compliments to Athletic Director Rachel Bergeson for her leadership in athletics.

**Homecoming** 100 Years of Homecoming was celebrated on campus in October 2021. The college was happy to successfully welcome back over 700 alumni and friends to celebrate this strong Cobber tradition.

She loved to laugh, dance, travel, visit art museums, listen to jazz, watch Hallmark movies, walk in the surf at the beach, and enjoy her daily scoop of vanilla ice cream.

**Barbara Myrom** passed away November 25, 2020, in Santa Rosa, CA. She left the world a more beautiful place – sprinkled with her passion, intelligence, sincerity, creativity, humor, music and artwork. Barbara was preceded in death by her loving life partner, Ben Stanley. She completed graduate work at the University of Minnesota in

special education for the culturally disadvantaged, beginning a lifelong concern with integrating the arts and self-expression. Barbara taught Studio Arts and Business at Princeton Senior High School, Princeton MN. Her business career began at Lockheed Martin in San Francisco, eventually becoming a manager.
