Our students, faculty, and staff were busy this past semester – composing, studying, practicing, and performing an increasingly varied, distinctly relevant, and always highquality array of musical topics, ideas, and repertoire. January featured the annual circuit721 electronic music composition recital. February included the premiere fully staged production, with live orchestra, of composer-in-residence Jonathan Stinson's opera *The Three Bears* and the Concordia Band's annual domestic tour in Minnesota. March included the Concordia Choir's tour of the Southeastern U.S., Chapel Choir's regional Minnesota tour, and the Concordia Orchestra's Senior Honors concert, as well as multiple guest artist visits and numerous student recitals. April included the annual Masterworks concert, this year featuring the Faure *Requiem* and Robert Ray's *Gospel Mass*. To cap off the semester, the Concordia Choir toured to Sweden and Norway in May. So much to celebrate!

Looking ahead, next fall will feature many of our regular fall concerts, including Homecoming, Three Choirs, PRISM, Fall Bands, Honor Strings, and Christmas Concerts, as well as the Concordia Band's tour to Montana (the Concordia Orchestra will tour in the spring this coming year, as well as the choirs). At Concordia's music department, we continue our commitment to influencing the affairs of the world by representing what is happening around us through music and offering solace, inspiration, and artistic reflection for our students and members of our community. # **Masterworks**

This spring's annual Masterworks Concert at Concordia College was a powerful celebration of musical diversity and collaboration. Performed by The Concordia Choir, Chapel Choir, Kantorei, and The Concordia Orchestra, the program featured Gabriel Fauré's *Requiem* and Robert Ray's *Gospel Mass*—two contrasting works that invited students to explore different vocal techniques and cultural traditions.

Conducted by Dr. Joseph Kemper with preparatory musical support from Dr. Michael Culloton, Dr. Kevin Sütterlin, and collaborative pianist Andrew Steinberg, the concert offered



students the opportunity to engage deeply with both the French Romantic and Black American gospel traditions. Ray's *Gospel Mass* featured a dynamic gospel band with Hammond organ, piano, electric bass, guitar, and drums, bringing high-energy spirit and authenticity to the performance. Several student soloists were featured across both works, showcasing the breadth of vocal talent within Concordia's choral program.



To prepare, students explored the historical and cultural contexts of both works—studying the liturgical foundations of Fauré's *Requiem* and the development of gospel music from African musical traditions, spirituals, blues, and jazz. A two-day residency with Dr. Eugene Rogers (University of Michigan, The Washington Chorus) deepened this learning through rehearsals, a conducting masterclass, and sessions on African and Black American vocal genres—enriching the entire Concordia community.



### **Concordia Opera** The Three Bears

In February, composer Jonathan Stinson joined Concordia Opera as composer-inresidence for a production of his opera *The Three Bears*. Thanks to a grant from the Lake Region Arts Council, 250 students from Dorothy Dodds Elementary School were able to attend a special preview performance. This production marked a new collaboration between Concordia's music and theatre departments and featured the Concordia Orchestra, along with fully realized costumes, props, and sets. A professional video recording of the performance will be submitted to both the National Opera Association's Collegiate Opera Production Competition and The American Prize Opera Competition later this year.



# **NATS Winners**





Three Concordia College voice majors— Jacob Schlueter, Tabatha Poppe, and Hank Bell, students of Dr. Robin Griffeath competed in the North Central Region of the National Association of Teachers of Singing

(NATS) this spring, with all three earning top placements and advancing to the National Student Auditions. Schlueter and Poppe each took second place in their respective divisions, while Bell placed fifth. Schlueter has since been named a national semifinalist, one of just fifteen underclassmen selected nationwide. Joining him as a semifinalist is Eleanor Iversen, a private student of Dr. Griffeath and high school junior from Fargo North, who is among only eight high school upper-class students advancing nationally. The live semifinal and final rounds will be held June 26–28, 2025, at Temple University in Philadelphia.

# 33<sup>rd</sup> Annual Percussion Day

The 33rd annual Concordia Percussion Day, held on Saturday, April 12, 2025, at Concordia College, was a resounding success. The day commenced with a dynamic performance by Moorhead High School's "Spud" Line and the Concordia Drumline, which set an energetic tone for the proceedings. Participants engaged in specialized clinics and performances led by guest artists Jenny Klukken, Mark Walker, and the Twincussion Duo. The day's festivities culminated in a concert featuring performances by the guest clinicians, Concordia's Percussion Ensemble, Jazz Ensemble, and Marimba Choir, offering a rich tapestry of musical styles and compositions. The success of Percussion Day was significantly bolstered by the support of Minnesota Lake Region Arts Council (LRAC), Concordia's Cultural Events, and the Music Department alongside all our sponsors, including Yamaha, Steve Weiss, Pearl-Adams, Marimba One, Paiste, and Innovative Percussion.

The Percussion Studio at Concordia hosted the Duo Vibracor (Aquim Sacramento and Ricardo Camponogara) on February 18, 2025. They offered a masterclass on Brazilian drums and played different street beats called "Batucada," an ensemble of drums approaching traditional rhythms and patterns. The students enjoyed this collaboration, learning and exploring different beats from Brazil. Their visit culminated with a concert at Christiansen Recital Hall, performing repertoire of Latin-American composers.

### **2025 Southeast Choir Tour**

The Concordia Choir's 2025 tour was a powerful journey of music, connection, and celebration. The tour began with a heartfelt mini-tour weekend in Sioux Falls and Maple Grove, featuring collaborations with local high school choirs and enthusiastic audiences. From March 1–16, the choir traveled across the Southeast United States, performing in Virginia, North Carolina, South Carolina, Florida, Georgia, and Tennessee, with additional concerts in Minnesota.



Highlights included collaborations with school and community choirs, such as in Charlotte, Orlando, and Gainesville, and special performances of Dr. Sandra Peter's commissioned piece "There Is There Is Love." The choir Room, performed in iconic venues like The Basilica of Saint Peter (Columbia, SC), Roswell United Methodist Church (GA), and First Presbyterian Church (Nashville), where they honored a milestone moment in their history with

a deeply moving return. Throughout the tour, the choir enjoyed moments of joy and rest—from beach visits in Florida to sightseeing at Silver Springs State Park. A

surprise appearance by former conductor **René Clausen** in Stillwater, MN, who conducted his beloved *"O My Love's Like a Red, Red Rose,"* provided an unforgettable emotional finale.

The tour concluded with a sold-out home concert in Moorhead, leaving the singers and audiences uplifted and inspired. Grateful for the memories made and the communities they connected with, the choir now looks ahead to future tours next stop: the Northeast United States in 2026.





### **2025 International Tour**

The Concordia Choir's 2025 international tour to Sweden and Norway was a breathtaking journey of music, culture, and unforgettable experiences. The trip began in Stockholm, where the choir explored historic Gamla Stan, toured the Vasa Museum, and performed at the Katolska Domkyrkan. They then traveled to Uppsala, delivering their first concert at the majestic Uppsala Domkyrka, the largest church in Scandinavia.

In Norway, the choir was warmly welcomed in Oslo, where they explored Frogner Park,

visited the Olympic ski jump, and performed at Paulus Church in collaboration with Schola Cantorum. Their journey continued to Bergen and Lillehammer, including a moving concert at Lillehammer Kirke with Mannskoret Klang, a men's choir with 125 years of history. A spontaneous performance in the acoustically stunning Hamar Glass Cathedral added another memorable moment.

The tour also featured breathtaking scenic travel. A day of train travel on the famed Flåm



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Railway offered panoramic views and waterfalls, followed by a ferry cruise through the UNESCO-listed Nærøyfjord. Onboard, the choir sang *"Norge, mitt Norge"* while surrounded by some of Norway's most aweinspiring landscapes—a highlight of the tour.

The following day, the choir performed in Bergen's Johanneskirken, made even more meaningful by a visit to Edvard Grieg's tomb earlier that day. The trip concluded with a concert at St. Petri Kirke in Stavanger,

and the last day of the tour included an optional hike to the famous Preikestolen, or Pulpit Rock. Now back home on summer break, the choir reflects with gratitude on the friendships, beauty, and music that made this international tour unforgettable.

### **Companion Tour**

In addition to the choir, we also had a group of family and friends traveling alongside the tour. The group included many parents and grandparents of singers in the choir, as well as alumni and friends of Concordia. Companions attended all the concerts and got to experience both Sweden and Norway while building new connections and friendships along the way! ### **2025 Domestic Band Tour**

The 2025 Domestic Tour was a resounding success! While on tour, the band worked with high school bands, coached chamber groups, provided masterclasses and lessons, and performed six concerts. Their stops included Willmar, Little Falls, St. Michael-Albertville, St. Paul, White Bear Lake, and Farmington. In White Bear Lake, they performed Kelijah Dunton's "Stillwater" with an ensemble of over 200 people. This year's repertoire also included "Picture Studies" by Adam Schoenberg, "Prism Rhapsody for Marimba and Wind Ensemble" by Keiko Abe featuring soloist Andrew Kocher '25, "Let My Love Be Heard" by Jake Runestad conducted by assistant conductor Joseph Koroll '25, "Motu" by Christopher Buchanan, and "Bamboo Shoots and City Streets" by Benjamin Barker. The Concordia Band also premiered "Triumphant Concordia" by Ethan Hyvari '25 written in honor of the 125<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of band at Concordia.

Joseph Koroll, Assistant Conductor of The Concordia Band says, "Being the first assistant conductor of The Concordia Band was an incredibly enriching and



moving experience. It was both an honor and a privilege to work alongside such talented musicians and dedicated colleagues. I deeply cherish the moments of connection that I shared with the band (personal and communal), the extremely kind and loving community of the ensemble, and the joy of performing together. Brianna Ware's *The Moirai* and Johannes Brahms's *Symphony No. 4 in E Minor, Op. 98*.

In April, attention turned to the Concordia College Masterworks Concert. The orchestra collaborated with The Concordia Choir, Chapel Choir, and Kantorei to prepare Robert Ray's *Gospel Mass* and Gabriel Fauré's *Requiem*.
