

Crisis in Iraq: What Americans Need to Know

In recent months, Iraq has plunged into its worst political crisis in years. The government has responded to mass protests, mostly by young people, with violent force. At the same time, conflict among political leaders has intensified. If we look beyond the headlines, what do Americans need to know about what is happening in Iraq? A Concordia student from Iraq will share her perspective, providing insider information and sparking discussion about political change in a key country in the Middle East. Lunch will be served.

"Instability in Iran: a Two-Front War?

April 7 | Jones C/D | 12-1pm

U.S. airstrikes leading to the death of Iranian military commander Qassam Soleimani in early January generated anti-U.S. anger and a military response from Iran. At the same time, the Iranian regime is the target of mass internal protests directed at the regime. Can Iran sustain a two-front war: one against the West and one against its own people? How should the United States respond? Has the U.S. killing of Soleimani made the world more peaceful or more conflictual? Who are the real beneficiaries of the US-Iran hostilities? Join us for a discussion led by Dr. Zakhirova on these and other questions related to U.S.-Iranian relations. Lunch will be served.

The Education of an Idealist: A Memoir by Samantha Power

In her memoir, Power offers an urgent response to the question "What can one person do?" and a call for a clearer eye, a kinder heart, and a more open and civil hand in our politics and daily lives. The Education of an Idealist traces Power's distinctly American journey from immigrant to war correspondent to presidential Cabinet official.

Educated: A Memoir by Tara Westover

Born to survivalists in the mountains of Idaho, Tara Westover was seventeen the first time she set foot in a classroom. Her family was so isolated from mainstream society that there was no one to ensure the children received an education, and no one to intervene when one of Tara's older brothers became violent. When another brother got himself into college, Tara decided to try a new kind of life. Her quest for knowledge transformed her, taking her over oceans and across continents, to Harvard and to Cambridge University.
